## B I O G R A P H I C A L   D A T A

GRACE LEE BOGGS, A.B. Barnard College; M.A., Ph.D., Bryn Mawr College, has been active in the Freedom Movement since the days of the first March on Washington Movement which extracted Executive Order 8802 from the Roosevelt administration.

In 1964 she was Coordinator of the Michigan Freedom Now Party. In 1968 she served as Education Director of the Inner City Organizing Committee in Detroit; as Coordinator of the Black Community-Educators Conference (held at Wayne State University, February 26, 1968); and Coordinator of the Black Ministers-Teachers Conference (held at the University of Detroit, April 27, 1968).

Born of Chinese parents in New England, Grace Boggs has a teaching certificate from Wayne State University and has taught in the Detroit Public Schools. Over the years she has written and lectured extensively on the subject of Education and the Black Struggle. Her article "EDUCATION: THE GREAT OBSESSION" was published in Monthly Review and Foresight magazines and reprinted as a pamphlet by the All-African Peoples Union in Detroit. Articles by her appear in Black Woman, edited by Toni Cade (Signet) and in What Black Educators are Saying, edited by Nathan Wright Jr. (Hawthorn).

She has co-authored a number of articles with her husband, James Boggs, the author of The American Revolution: Pages from a Negro Worker's Notebook and Racism and the Class Struggle. Among these are "The City is the Black Man's Land" and "Uprooting Racism and Racists in the United States." The Boggs' latest book, Revolution and Evolution in the Twentieth Century, will be published by Monthly Review Press in the spring of 1974.

Born in New England of Chinese parents, she is the wife of James Boggs, author of The American Revolution: Pages from a Negro Worker's Notebook and of the Manifesto for a Black Revolutionary Party. Among the articles she has co-authored with her husband are "The City is the Black Man's Land" (published April 1966) and "Detroit: Birth of a Nation" (published October 1967).
